Northwest

Acquisition Funds: Ballard, Bitter Lake, Fremont, Greenwood-Phinney Ridge

Community Garden Funds: Ballard

1 Northacres Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$550,000

2 Golden Gardens Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$500,000

3 Crown Hill Elementary Park
Development of park land that is expected to be acquired from the Seattle School District.
Allocation: \$1,200,000

4 Sandel Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$350,000

5 7th Elect Site Park
Development of parcel at 7028 9th Ave NW bought with ProParks and other funds.
Allocation: \$800,000

Central West

Acquisition Funds: Belltown, Denny Triangle, Commerical Core, Int'l District

Green Space Funds: NE Queen Anne Greenbelt

Community Garden Funds: Queen Anne

Queen Anne & Magnolia
Develop Off-leash Dog Areas, specific locations TBD.
Allocation: \$140,000

11 Discovery Park Capehart
Restore Capehart site including slab and roadway demolition and removal, grading, and seeding.
Allocation: \$1,000,000

12 Kiwanis Ravine
Restore habitat of a major heron rookery.
Allocation: \$600,000

13 Lawton Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$300,000

14 Bayview Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$250,000

Southwest

Acquisition Funds: Morgan/West Seattle Junctions, Westward-Highland, Beach Drive

Green Space Funds: Arroyos Natural Area, East Duwamish/Duwamish Head/West Duwamish Greenbelts

Community Garden Funds: West Seattle

21 Delridge Playfield Improvements
Renovate this lit sand field to provide synthetic turf.
Allocation: \$3,200,000

22 Fairmount Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$170,000

23 Camp Long
Renovation of this environmental learning center and family camp.
Allocation: \$1,000,000

24 West Duwamish Trail
Create a linear park, including bicycle and trail improvements, along the Duwamish River.
Allocation: \$2,000,000

6 Woodland Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$350,000

7 Lower Woodland Playfields
Renovate field #7 to provide synthetic turf and more energy efficient lighting.
Renovate field #2 to provide synthetic turf.
Allocation: \$2,800,000 for field #7 and \$2,400,000 for field #2.

8 Burke-Gilman Trail
Complete multi-purpose trail through Ballard.
Allocation: \$3,750,000.
(This funding could cover 50% of the cost, with the expectation that remaining funding would come from other sources.)

9 Ross Playfield Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$450,000

10 Gas Works Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$1,400,000

15 Queen Anne Blvd
Continue improvements to this historic Olmsted Blvd.
Allocation: \$250,000

16 Bhy Kracke Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$150,000

17 Lake-to-Bay Trail
Construct Thomas St Overpass as first phase of bike/pedestrian trail from Myrtle Edwards Park to Lake Union.
Allocation: \$1,500,000

18 Victor Steinbrueck Park
Improvements to public safety.
Allocation: \$1,600,000

19 International District Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$500,000

20 Hing Hay Park
Renovation of existing park and development of newly acquired park land.
Allocation: \$3,000,000

25 Georgetown Playfield Wading Pool
Conversion of wading pool to a spray pad/park.
Allocation: \$400,000

26 Myrtle Reservoir Skatespot
Development of a new skatepark.
Allocation: \$250,000

27 Roxhill Playground & Skatespot
Improving and addressing safety issues the playground and development of a new skatepark.
Allocation: \$450,000 for the playground and \$600,000 for the Skatespot

28 West Seattle Reservoir (Westcrest Park) Development
Development of a park on the reservoir lid.
Allocation: \$3,000,000

29 Marra-Desimone Farm
Development of a park, which includes Marra Farm, Seattle largest site of urban gardening, in accordance with long-range development plan.
Allocation: \$1,100,000

Northeast

Acquisition Funds: Lake City, Ravenna, University Urban, Wedgewood

Green Space Funds: Ravenna Woods, Thornton Creek Watershed

47 Cedar Park Renovation
Renovation of Cedar Park in northeast Seattle on land acquired from the School District.
Allocation: \$500,000

48 Northgate Urban Center Park Development
Development of first phase of this new parkland.
Allocation: \$2,500,000

49 Matthews Beach Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$450,000

50 Magnuson Park Shoreline & Entry Improvements
Improvements to shoreline access and development of a bicycle pathway to the 65th Street entrance.
Allocation: \$500,000

51 Maple Leaf Reservoir Park
Develop parks on new reservoir lids and/or acquire land to extend the reservoir parks.
Allocation: \$5,000,000

52 Maple Leaf Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$450,000

53 Laurelhurst Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$400,000

Central East

Acquisition Funds: 12th Ave, Capitol Hill, First Hill

41 Montlake Playfield
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$550,000

42 Washington Park Arboretum
Further implementation of Arboretum Master Plan including the Pacific Connections Garden, trails, and other improvements.
Allocation: \$2,500,000

43 Volunteer Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$800,000

44 Seattle Asian Art Museum
Renovations include seismic and HVAC upgrades.
Allocation: \$9,000,000

45 Langston Hughes Performing Arts Center
Seismic improvements for continued use of the building.
Allocation: \$2,500,000

46 Judkins Playground Skatespot
Development of a new skatepark.
Allocation: \$600,000

Southeast

Acquisition Funds: North Rainier

Community Garden Funds: Rainier Valley

30 Atlantic Street Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$350,000

31 Beacon Hill Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$180,000

32 Children's Play Garden
Expand and improve this park, which is the first in the nation for children with disabilities.
Allocation: \$950,000

33 Jefferson Park Improvements
Further development of the Jefferson Park Master Plan and the construction of a skate park.
Allocation: \$5,000,000 towards the master plan and an additional \$1,000,000 towards the skatepark

34 Rainier Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$600,000

35 Genesee Playfield Improvements
Renovate this lit sand field to provide synthetic turf.
Allocation: \$2,100,000

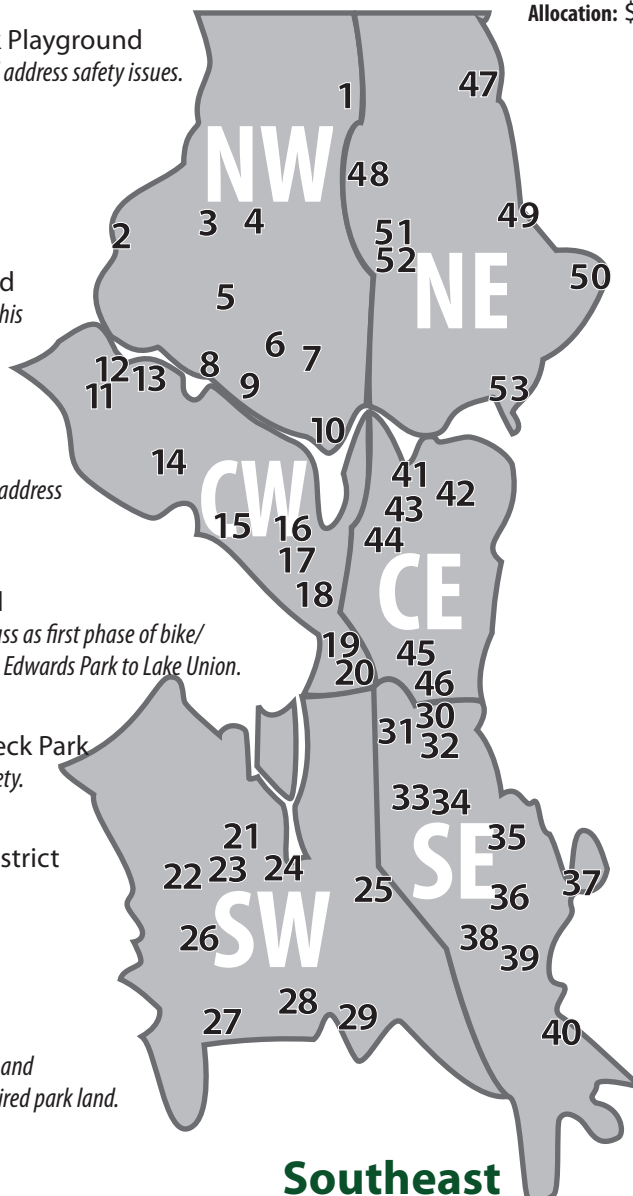
36 Brighton Playfield Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$450,000

37 Seward Park Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$450,000

38 John C. Little Playground
Renovation to improve and address safety issues.
Allocation: \$300,000

39 Othello Playground
Safety and light improvements
Allocation: \$250,000

40 Chinook Beach Park Renovations
Completion of Chinook Beach Park.
Allocation: \$100,000



Acquisition Funds Allocation: \$30,000,000
Acquisition of Neighborhood Parks and Green Spaces identified from the 2006 Parks Department Development Plan & Gap Analysis as areas deficient in parks & open space.

Opportunity Fund Allocation: \$15,000,000
Provides funding for neighborhood and community projects that could include acquisition and/or development of off-leash areas, community gardens, P-Patches, trails, and neighborhood parks.

Environment Funds Allocation: \$6,600,000
Forest & Stream Restoration: Green Seattle Partnership (\$3,500,000), Kiwanis Ravine(\$600,000)
Community Gardens: Acquisition & development of community gardens & p-patches (\$2,000,000)
Shoreline Access: Develop City-owned street-ends for publicly accessible shoreline (\$500,000)

Yes on Prop 2!

The 2008 Parks & Green Spaces Levy provides \$145 million over six years for projects throughout the city, just \$81 per year for the typical homeowner — \$30 per year less than the expiring Pro Parks Levy.
